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- b. The capacity and disposition of the adopting individual or individuals to educate and create an environment that fosters the religion, racial identity, and culture of the adoptee.
- c. The capacity and disposition of the adopting individual or individuals to provide the adoptee with food, clothing, education, permanence, medical care, or other remedial care recognized and permitted under the laws of this state in place of medical care, and other material needs.
- d. The length of time the adoptee has lived in a stable, satisfactory environment, and the desirability of maintaining continuity.
- e. The permanence as a family unit of the proposed adoptive home.
- f. The moral fitness of the adopting individual or individuals.

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OFFICE OF CHILDREN'S OMBUDSMAN

OMBUDSMAN	
	The Children's Ombudsman Act, MCL 722.921, et. seq., created the Office of the Children's Ombudsman (OCO). While this office is located within the Department of Management and Budget, it is an autonomous agency. The purpose of the OCO is to monitor and ensure compliance with relevant statutes, rules and policies pertaining to children's protective services (CPS), foster care, juvenile justice, and adoption.
	Section 4(2) of the act charges the OCO with the establishment of procedures for receiving and processing complaints, conducting investigations, holding hearings, and reporting investigative findings. The Act also requires MDHHS to provide relevant information as required and cooperate with the Ombudsman in the carrying out of their responsibilities; see <u>SRM 132, Response to the Office of Children's Ombudsman</u> .
OTHER EXPENSES	
	As defined in MCL 400.115f(q), adoption costs incurred by or on behalf of the adoptive parent and for which the adoptive parent carries the ultimate liability for payment, including the family assessment, health and psychological examinations, supervision of the placement before adoption, and transportation and reasonable costs of lodging and food for the child or adoptive parent if necessary to complete the adoption or placement process.
RELATIVES	
	An individual who is at least 18 years of age and related to the child within the fifth degree by blood, marriage, or adoption, including the spouse of an individual related to the child within the fifth degree, even after the marriage has ended by death or divorce, the parent who shares custody of a half-sibling, and the parent of a man whom the court has found probable cause to believe is the putative father if there is no man with legally established rights to the child.
	A relative may also be an individual who is at least 18 years of age and not related to a child within the fifth degree by blood, marriage, or adoption but who has a strong positive emotional tie or role in the child's life or the child's parent's life if the child is an infant, as determined by the department or, if the child is an Indian child, as
